EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Who has one head, three legs, 45 arms, multiple relationships, and thinks about sex all the time? Planned Parenthood BC, of course.

Our head, in the person of Suzie Soman, the President of PPABC, brings warmth, realism, and immense dedication to the organization. I would like to thank Suzie for her personal support and encouragement over the past year.

Our three legs are the clinical services program, the education program, and the advocacy program. Highlights of the clinical services program in 2002-03 include 10% growth in client visits, introduction of a continual client satisfaction survey, and significant expansion of the number of nurses capable of working under delegated medical function. The education program prospered under an enhanced focus on marketing, progress toward our goal of introducing a certification program for educators, and an effective new advertising campaign for the Facts of Life Line. The advocacy program was introduced in 2002 by the PPABC Board of Directors and substantial work was done on an initiative on school sexual health education due to be launched in 2004. We also organized Sexual Health Week in the fall of 2002.

Admittedly, in 2002–03 we had only 41 arms in the form of our Branches and clinics (we acquired four more clinics when the West Kootenay Branch joined PPABC in June 2003). Thank you to all the Branch Boards who worked so hard in 2002–03 to recruit staff and volunteers, pay the bills, and maintain our presence in communities across the province. I am also grateful for the Branch Board support and teamwork that was so crucial in making the adjustments required to meet new gaming policy. The result was a formula for sharing the resources of the organization more equitably and effectively.

Our multiple relationships in 2002–03 encompassed the McCreary Centre Society, the new Provincial Health Services Authority and regional health authorities in several areas of the province, Royal Roads University, and a variety of cultural, community and professional organizations. PPABC was also a significant presence across the Planned Parenthood Federation of Canada during the year, providing extensive program materials and consultative support to other affiliates, and two representatives on the PPFC Board of Directors.



Do we really think about sex all the time? Not quite. We also thought about honouring those among us whose contribution to PPABC and our clients stood out among the rest. They included:

- Katherine Preston, who won a Helen and Fred Bentley Award for her work with the Sto:lo First Nation on a First Nation Workshop on reproductive Health and Sexuality
- Barbara Clague, recipient of the Dorothy Shaw Award for outstanding voluntary leadership, in recognition of her substantial impact and influence on PPABC and PPFC
- Joyce Martin of Nanaimo and Susan Flynn from Chilliwack, who received Volunteer of the Year Awards for their energetic dedication to both the governance and service delivery aspects of their Branches.
- Dr. Laurie Logan, who received the Jeffrey Dolph Memorial Award for her compassionate and respectful care of our clients
- Joy Becker, recipient of the 2002 Education Award for her exceptional skill, creativity and leadership

I would like to say a special thank you to the staff and volunteers of PPABC who, in every encounter they have, represent our values and vision as an organization with the eloquence of their intelligence, creativity, caring, energy, and integrity.

Year in Review

New Government Grants Two Wishes

Planned Parenthood BC sought three changes in its relationship with the provincial government. The first was a return to the health portfolio (from the child and family development portfolio) to reflect our position as a mainstream public health organization. The second was the ability to negotiate funding at the provincial level, to avoid inconsistent outcomes with regional health authorities that could result in uneven services to British Columbians. The government responded very positively to both of these in 2002. PPABC's contractual relationship is now with the Provincial Health Services Authority.

The third was a change in the mix of revenues we currently draw from government, which we felt offered benefits to both parties. While the government did not see the way clear to make this change, two important features of the year bear noting.

One is that PPABC did not experience any reduction in funding; the other is that the Provincial Health Services Authority indicated an interest in other revisions we proposed to the structure of our service agreement to reflect more accurately the scope of our activities.

Lots of Free Advice

PPABC took a Leadership Challenge to the Masters in Leadership and Training class at Royal Roads in July 2002. We asked for advice on how to move the organization from controversy to a more confident and assertive position. Six different teams provided a host of excellent ideas, including changing our name and adjusting our organizational culture to reflect our values and vision. Among other things this gave strong impetus to the Board's Advocacy Working

Group, which is developing an initiative on school sexual health education for implementation in early 2004. The Royal Roads teams also stressed the importance of considering a new name, the better to reflect our values and vision. That advice launched a process for selecting a new name that will culminate in a members' vote at the September, 2003 Annual General Meeting.

Client Survey Gives Valuable Feedback

PPABC also introduced a periodic client satisfaction survey in our clinics. With over 39,000 client visits a year, we'd better know what works for them and what doesn't! Our clients gave us good advice about how to make their experience better, but overall, we seem to be doing well. Data gathered during 2002–03 indicated that our clients like us mainly because our

prices are better, because we are friendlier, and because we take the time to explain things.

"Always a very friendly place, I feel safe here"

95 to 99% of clients told us that we are meeting their expectations about privacy and confidentiality, that they felt encouraged and supported, received the information they

needed to make their choice, and were able to ask questions and get answers. 88% of our clients were served in the time expected; however, a lot of them complained about long waiting times. Just 3% said they felt the prices of contraceptive products were too high.

63% of clients first heard about our clinic through a friend. About one in six heard about us from a doctor, through school, or in some other unspecified way. On the other hand, our Facts of Life Line doesn't seem to get the attention it deserves—only a third of clients said they were given the Facts of Life Line number at the clinic (1-800-SEX-SENSE).



Focus Groups Help with FOLL Campaign

campaign proved to be excellent advice. The "It's Your Call" campaign attracted more than phone calls: the colourful bus ads quickly became collectors' items.

The Facts of Life Line received 6098 calls in 2002-03, an average of twenty calls each day the Line operates. The telephone service was supplemented by an e-mail response feature accessible through the PPABC website. Of particular note was the increase in calls from health professionals—a clear indication of the recognition of the quality and reliability of PPABC's information and guidance.

BC'S First Sexual Health Week

October 7–11 2002 was Sexual Health Week in BC, thanks to an initiative of PPABC and months of hard work by Tania Pitcairn, a student who won a Planned Parenthood bursary from the Maple Ridge Branch and was given a summer job with the Provincial Office organizing the Week. The focus of this first and relatively modest event was on community outreach, information to the media, and speaking opportunities as they arose.

Our People Make a Difference

PPABC and Educator Katherine Preston won second place in the Planned Parenthood Federation of Canada Helen and Fred Bentley Awards of Excellence for Katherine's superb work on a First Nations Workshop on Reproductive Health and Sexuality. We also acknowledge the powerful contribution made to this project by Millie Silver and Ida John of the Sto:lo Nation.

Kathy Cassels, our Educator in New Westminster, won the BC Medical Association's Award of Excellence in Health Promotion. Kathy has been with PPABC since 1981.



Relationships

The Langley Branch Board entered its thirtieth year of service in 2002-03; by contrast, our newest Branch opened in Grand Forks in February 2003, and the northern community of Houston was also added to the PPABC network.

In October, PPABC marked the first anniversary of the busy Iron Horse Youth Clinic in Maple Ridge, and the Clinic served its 1000th client shortly afterward. A new Branch Board was established for Vancouver, North Vancouver, and Burnaby, after over a decade without this important community management presence.

The. PPABC and the McCreary Centre Society formed a new working relationship of sharing information and exploring a



variety of opportunities for joint activity by colocating, with substantial cost savings for both agencies.


Strength in Numbers

Every non-profit organization needs to be able to demonstrate that it has support from the community at large; that support reassures granting agencies, the media, clients and the interested public. In 2002-03, PPABC enjoyed the support of 224 members from every part of the province, and beyond. We benefited from the hard work of more than 500-volunteers in our clinics, on Branch and Provincial Boards, in community outreach activities and with our nurses on the Facts of Life Line. We received generous financial donations from 207 individuals, employee groups, businesses, and other community service organizations. The lan F Manning Memorial Fund donated \$3600 for the support of education programs. Three individuals-Cheri Reid, Cyril Relph, and Greg Smith-donated \$1000 or more.


Clinic and Facts of Life Line Services

Two main sources of education and service we provide are our clinics and the Facts of Life Line. It is useful to realize the services we provide not only attract clients, but retain them, as can be seen in the chart to the right.

Although our clinics see people of all ages, one of our priorities is to provide entry into the health care system for young people in a nonjudgmental, supportive atmosphere. This, combined with access to the Facts of Life Line, provides young people with the information they need to make informed decisions.



Age Breakdown by Percentage 2003



The chart above shows that nearly 85% of all clients visiting our clinics are between the ages of 16 to 29. The ratios are somewhat different for Facts of Life Line callers. Although the greatest percentage of callers is still between the ages of 16 to 29 (70%), more than 25% are between 30 to 39 years of age.

Project Funding Yields Big Results

Among the "biggest" results were the gigantic genitals on two libidinous space aliens in the outrageously funny and hard-hitting play, "Trojan Rap", created by the Sunshine Coast Branch with funding from the Vancouver Foundation. This production of dialogue, dance, and live music was a collaboration of theatre professionals and local young people. It sold out every night and audiences engaged in a "talk-back" session after each show. Alien anatomy aside, the play provided realistic, often amusing and sometimes unnerving portrayals of issues that arise in our relationships. Excerpts from the play provided background for a session on social action theatre at PPABC's Education Conference in October, presented by Sunshine Coast President Donna Schmirler.

PPABC also received funding from the Ministry of Health Planning to prepare suggested implementation plans for recommendations that came from our workshop on the National Framework on Sexual and Reproductive Health in 2001. This provided an excellent opportunity to open a dialogue with the province about where action can be

taken to improve the sexual health status of British Columbians. Some of this work—dealing with school sexual health education - closely complemented the activities of the PPABC Board's Advocacy Working Group.

The Columbia Basin Trust has proved to be a strong supporter of improved reproductive health services in the Columbia Basin, beginning the previous year with Revelstoke. In 2002–03 The CBT provided substantial support to two projects in the Kootenays designed to study how we can deliver services effectively to small and widely dispersed communities. In the East Kootenays the focus was on the potential for traveling clinical services; a team in the West Kootenays studied the feasibility of creating a regional structure to achieve the goal. Both projects involved the participation of a number of service agencies. PPABC acknowledges as well the ongoing core support we receive from the United Way of the Lower Mainland. In 2002-03 this support remained constant in spite of real resources challenges faced by the United Way.
